## JIMBA, Masamine Keynote Speaker



Professor and chair of the Department of Community and Global Health at the Graduate School of Medicine, the University of Tokyo since 2006. After being educated both in Japan and USA, he has had a variety of global health experiences in the Gaza Strip and West Bank (2 years for WHO) and in Nepal (5 years for JICA). He believes that research, policy and practices must be linked for global health promotion. His current interest is slow research and positive deviance approach, which can improve sustainability of health promotion efforts at local level for a long period of time.



EAR, Chariya

A prominent road safety expert in Cambodia and a founding director of the Institute for Road Safety. He discovered his passion for road safety 14 years ago after reflecting on his personal experience and the loss of his friends and relatives because of the preventable road crashes. He has been working as a national road safety specialist for various projects in Cambodia including with the Asian Development Bank, the Ministry of Public Works and Transport, and Ministry of Rural Development. He previously served as a Road Safety Program manager for Handicap International. He received his Master of International Studies from the University of Tokyo in 2010.



SIM, Vireak Panelist

A career diplomat. His first posting was in Tokyo from 2010-2014. He also has experience in private sector when he led a Phnom Penh branch office of Meiho Engineering Inc., a Japanese consulting firm. In addition to his professional background in foreign policy, his interests are in 1) government policies to stimulate private sector, to attract foreign direct investment and diversify economic base and industry, 2) infrastructure development and 3) the economic positioning of Cambodia within ASEAN. Mr. Sim holds a Master Degree on international politics from the University of Tokyo.
