Available positions: Project Researcher, 1 or a few persons

Contract period: May 1, 2025 or at the earliest after - March 31, 2026

Renewal or not: The contract will be renewed on an annual basis, considering the budget situation, the worker's progress engaged in, the workload at the end of the contract period, work performance, work attitude, health status, etc. However, renewal shall be limited to March 31, 2028, and will not be renewed thereafter.
